The Pastor's Pen

"The Great Ends of the Church"

In the early part of the 20th century American Presbyterians developed and adopted what is now a classic statement of the purpose of the church (at least from the Presbyterian perspective). That statement is known as "The Great Ends of the Church." There are six of them:

- ◇ The proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind;
- ◇ The shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God;
- ◇ The maintenance of divine worship;
- ◇ The preservation of the truth;
- ◇ The promotion of social righteousness; and
- ◇ The exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world.

The Great Ends are of course the subject of the six stunning banners hanging in our narthex, the work of our own Lee Bechtel.

There are many statements available on what the church is and should be all about, but the Great Ends are probably as good a summary as any. They are recorded in the constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Also recorded there is another statement about the church, which has become one of my favorites over the years. "The Church is to be a community of faith, entrusting itself to God alone, even at the risk of losing its life." We must be willing to risk even the continued existence of our own church for the sake of Christ and his gospel. As I have pronounced from the pulpit numerous times, "It's not about us." It's about Christ, and only about Christ.

As we chart the future of Community Presbyterian Church as guided by the Holy Spirit, we must always be asking the following kinds of questions. How can we best proclaim the gospel, the good news of life in Jesus? How can we best provide shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship for the children of God? How can we faithfully worship and glorify the living God in worship? What must we do to preserve God's truth? How do we meet the needs of our community and the world (social righteousness)? How do we, as Community Presbyterian Church, exhibit the Kingdom of Heaven to the world?

Health Advice from the Parish Nurse

Hypertension

A blood pressure check measures the force of blood pushing against your artery walls as your heart pumps blood. Your blood pressure normally rises and falls throughout the day, but when it stays high over time, the condition is called hypertension, which damages arteries and causes your heart to work harder than normal to circulate blood to your organs. This can lead to stroke, heart attack, heart failure, and kidney disease. The higher number (systolic) measures artery pressure when the heart beats and the lower number (diastolic) measures the pressure between beats, when the heart relaxes. Systolic/diastolic pressures lower than 120/80 are considered normal.

There are generally no symptoms of hypertension. With extremely high blood pressure, you may experience a severe headache, chest pain, shortness of breath, vision changes, or a nosebleed. Your risk for hypertension increases if you have a family history or if you have an unhealthy lifestyle such as smoking, too much salt or alcohol in your diet, lack of exercise, excessive weight, and chronic stress.

To control your blood pressure; reduce your salt intake, eat plenty of fruits and vegetables, exercise with aerobic exercises and strength training, and maintain a healthy weight.

Your Session at Work!

The Session of Community Presbyterian Church met on July 16 for its monthly stated meeting. At that meeting the Session...

- ◇ Heard from the Mission Committee (Jan Ackart) that roughly 400 meals per day continue to be delivered to children in Cedar and Enoch by the summer lunch crew, that five people have volunteered for the July 27 to August 3 mission trip to Mora, New Mexico, and that investigation of participation in Living Waters for the World continues;
- ◇ Approved a motion from the Mission Committee to send \$4,000 to Iron County Care and Share;
- ◇ Heard from the Children's Ministries Committee (Lynne Brown) that Vacation Bible School will have to be cancelled for the summer of 2013 due to the lack of necessary volunteers;
- ◇ Heard from the Property & Maintenance Committee (Amarante Vasquez) that sprinkler system repairs are complete, a ceiling fan has been installed in the library, air conditioning in the kitchen and youth room has been repaired, oversight of the custodial crew continues, paint has been touched up throughout the building, carpets have been cleaned in the fellowship hall and hallways, and paint and carpet are due soon for the elementary classroom;
- ◇ Approved a motion from Property & Maintenance to spend no more than \$1,900 to seal parking lot cracks;
- ◇ Approved two motions from the Personnel Committee (Neal Smith) dealing with sick leave and administrative leave for church employees working 20 hours per week or more; requested modification of a third motion dealing with vacation;
- ◇ Approved the granting of 80 hours of administrative leave to Admin Assistant Marci Beck due to her recent prolonged illness;
- ◇ Heard from the Church Life Committee (Julie Dempsey) that the Independence Day Barbeque was fun, even with few attendees, and that plans continue for the annual all-church campout at Duck Creek, August 2-4;
- ◇ Approved Rally Day 2013 and its date of August 25;
- ◇ Voted not to extend an invitation to Centro Cristiano El Shaddai to share the CPC building.

Centro Cristiano El Shaddai

The Session thanks all members and friends of Community Presbyterian who provided comments regarding the church's proposed hosting agreement with Centro Cristiano El Shaddai. After much prayer and diligent seeking after God's will in this matter, the Session has decided not to pursue the hosting arrangement. Your prayers for both CCES and Community Presbyterian Church are greatly appreciated.

Deacon and Session Vacancies

We sadly report the resignation of Frances Dodds from the Board of Deacons and Alan Calliham from the Session. We are grateful to both Frances and Alan for their dedicated and distinguished service to our church.

Our attitude towards and use of the financial gifts we receive from the living God are clear reflections of our individual growth as disciples.





The following Sunday the reverend asked for a show of hands from those who had read Mark 17. Every hand went up. Pastor Bob smiled and announced, "Well, Mark has only 16 chapters. I will now proceed with my sermon on the sin of lying."


Foxes Have Holes

As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." (Luke 9:57-62)

This passage in Luke's gospel (and its parallel in Matthew chapter 8) has compelled me for many years. Three individuals encounter Jesus and find that following him is not as easy as they thought. The first one finds that the journey may require giving up comfort, even the comfort of a roof over her head. The second one needs to deal with his father's funeral before he can follow. Jesus calls him to come and proclaim the gospel, now, even with the funeral pending. The third one wants to say goodbye to family and friends. Jesus replies, "Come now. No looking back. Follow me."

It is much too easy to convince ourselves that the way of Jesus the Messiah will never place any demands on our time or effort or resources. In this passage and in many others we read something entirely different. In fact, if following Jesus is always comfortable for us, we can be sure we are not following Jesus. How is your journey progressing?


